ALL ABOUT WIRES!

A presentation by Dale Douglass

Wire is used everywhere in the radio world. Wire antennas are subject to the stresses of temperature, wind, and ice and require sufficient mechanical strength to be able to hold up under demanding conditions. Guy wire is different from the wire used for grounding. Guy wire has mechanical strength requirements not needed for ground wire, while ground wire has to be able to handle the currents that may be imposed by lightning or power line faults. Hard drawn copper, soft drawn copper, Copperweld, steel, and aluminum wire all have their applications. This talk will be about the electrical and mechanical properties of wire and why one might be better than another for a particular application.

Dale Douglass is a world-known expert on the mechanical and electrical properties of overhead electrical conductors. He is a Fellow of the IEEE and chairs the Towers Poles and Conductors Committee of the IEEE Power Engineering Society. He has been active in the development of conductor-related standards. He previously worked for Bell Labs, Kaiser Aluminum (a conductor manufacturer), and Power Technologies Inc. and is presently with Power Delivery Consultants. Sag-tension under different loading conditions and temperature rise as affected by current and weather are among his specialties. Dale resides in Niskayuna.

RACES/ARES/Mass Casualty Drill – Saturday, September 15, 2007

The FCC doesn't give us licenses so we can blabber, contest, or chase DX. We are a resource and are expected to either advance the science or contribute to society by volunteering our services. There aren't that many of us who have the talent to advance the science. That leaves volunteering our services and we should. It's the right thing to do.

So what happens when a railroad car carrying chlorine explodes in Glenville? Well, a green cloud drifts over the Guard Base and the Glenville Town Offices, forcing their evacuation. Over 50 volunteer victims were first decontaminated, then triaged, then transported to either Ellis or St. Clare's Hospital. Emergency rooms were overwhelmed and that was part of the plan.

For this drill, we played a secondary communications role. Drill planners wanted to see how well the fire radios, ambulance radios, and cell phones would perform. Hams did a good job of making sure that the volunteer victims didn't get lost.

I know that most of you say to yourselves that if it were a real disaster, I would be the first in line to volunteer. Imagine a football coach letting someone play in the big game if they never showed up for practice. Participating in this drill were W2DHT Bill Patmos, W2BEJ Tony Pazzola, KC2BLC Larry Eaton, KC2NXC Bill Proctor, N2PEQ, JR Hotaling, N2LBT Dennis Hudson, W2FPG Frank Gagliardi, and W2UI Tim Long.
